USA (2-0) VS. FRANCE (1-1)

- **In Tokyo:** Despite 18 points and nine rebounds from Sandrine Gruda and 12 points and six rebounds from Endene Miyem, France was clipped by host Japan 74-70 in its Olympic opener. France came back strong against Nigeria, recording an 87-62 victory behind 14 points and nine rebounds from Gruda and 13 from four different players.
- **FIBA World Ranking:** 5
- **Olympic Qualification Path:** Silver medalists at the 2019 FIBA EuroBasket, France finished with a 3-0 mark at the 2020 FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament in France.
- **Top Olympic Finish:** Silver medal in 2012.
- **All-Time Olympic Finishes:** Silver medal, fourth place (2016) and fifth place (2000).
- **All-Time Olympic Record:** 16-7
- **All-Time Record v USA in Olympic History:** USA 2, France 0

- The USA will find out its quarterfinal match-up following the draw that will be held after the final preliminary round game is played.

RECORD WATCH

- With each game played, **Diana Taurasi** adds to the all-time most women's Olympic basketball games played record. Heading into the game against France, she remains alone at the top with 34 games played. **Sue Bird** is poised to break through as the lone player in the No. 2 position. She is currently tied with several former U.S. players at 32.
- Tina Charles** is one point away from breaking into the top 10 among scorers in U.S. Olympic women's history.
- Sylvia Fowles** and **Brittney Griner** are tied with three other for third on the all-time women's U.S. Olympic blocked shot list. One will bring them to the No. 2 spot alongside **Candace Parker**. The No. 1 spot belongs to **Lisa Leslie**, who swatted 37 from 1996-2008.

APPROACHING MILESTONES

If they play in all scheduled games, the following athletes will hit significant milestones with USA Basketball in 2021: Should the USA advance to the Olympic finals, **Tina Charles** will play in game No. 100 and **Breanna Stewart** will hit No. 99.

WINNING STREAK

The USA National Team has not lost a game at a FIBA competition since 2006, tallying **65-straight** victories since the 2006 World Cup bronze medal win. The streak includes two games in Tokyo, the 2020 FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament, 2019 FIBA Americas Pre-Olympic Qualifying Tournament; 2007 and 2019 FIBA AmeriCups; 2006 World Cup bronze medal game; 2010, 2014 and 2018 World Cups; and 2008, 2012 and 2016 Olympic Games.

FOR THE STATS GEEK

The USA women have tallied a combined **6,473 points** (91.2 ppg.), **3,024 rebounds** (42.6 rpg.) and **1,430 assists** (20.1 apg.) while compiling a **68-3** record in **10+** Olympic competitions (through its two games in Tokyo).

THE NUMBERS GAME

- The USA's Olympic winning streak is **51** games, dating from the 1992 bronze medal game through the second game in Tokyo.
- The USA's World Cup winning streak is **22-0**, dating from the 2006 bronze medal game through the USA's gold medal victory over Australia in 2018.
- The USA National Team's winning streak in official FIBA competitions is **65** games (2006 FIBA World Cup bronze medal game and **21-0** in the 2010, 2014 and 2019 FIBA World Cups; **26-0** in the 2008, 2012, 2016 and 2020 Olympics; **11-0** in the 2007 and 2019 FIBA AmeriCups; **3-0** in the 2019 FIBA Americas Pre-Olympic Qualifying Tournament; and 3-0 in the 2020 FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament).
- Since 1996**, the highly successful USA Basketball Women's National Team program, currently ranked No. 1 in the world by FIBA, has posted a **114-1 slate in major international competitions**, and includes the team's first two victories in Tokyo, an amazing six consecutive Olympic gold medals (1996, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016), five FIBA World Cup golds (1998, 2002, 2010, 2014, 2018), one FIBA World Cup bronze medal (2006), two FIBA AmeriCup gold medals (2007, 2019), a 3-0 mark in FIBA Americas Pre-Olympic Qualifying play and 3-0 in FIBA Olympic Qualifying games.
- Dating to the 1995-96 USA National Team's exhibition schedule, the USA is **200-18** in exhibition play, including its three recent exhibitions in Las Vegas.

OLYMPIC MEDALISTS

The top five all-time Olympic basketball medalists, male or female, across all nations, are the USA's **Teresa Edwards**, **Sue Bird**, **Tamika Catchings**, **Lisa Leslie** and **Diana Taurasi**. Edwards has five — four golds and one bronze — and the others have four golds apiece.

FIVE TIMERS

Until this year, there were only two women who had competed in five Olympic Games, the USA's **Teresa Edwards** (1984-2000) and Brazil's **Adriana Pinto** (2000-16). **Sue Bird** and **Diana Taurasi** are now officially part of that exclusive club.

BY THE NUMBERS

Heading into its game against Japan, the 2020 U.S. Olympic Team owns the following records:

RED VS. BLUE JERSEYS

The USA Women's National Team is the only USA Basketball team that wears a red uniform. All the other teams wear blue, to include junior teams and the men's national team. The red jersey was launched for the 1995-96 USA WNT and holds special meaning to those who wear it. It's a rite of passage for USA junior athletes who have progressed through the system and attend their first WNT camp to receive their first red jersey.

2020 U.S. OLYMPIC JERSEY DESIGN

The 2020 U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team's red jerseys have several iconic and meaningful design elements.

Nike created the red uniform specifically for the USA women's team, and the red uniform features classically blocked typography on the chest. The laurel line on the neckline is reminiscent of the uniforms from the '96 women's team in Atlanta, a team that launched the USA's Olympic gold medal streak, and mirrors the wreath traditionally placed on the heads of victors. The navy side panels are an ode to the past, as is the script emblematic of the '96 team on the shorts. Twelve stars, six down each side of the jersey, represent the number of athletes on the team. A hidden detail on the side vent on the shorts reveals the number of players on USA Basketball's all-time Olympic roster (84), the team's number of Olympic appearances (10) and the number of Olympic gold medals won (eight).

Additionally, the wording on the bottom of the USA's shooting shirts is "E Pluribus Unum." Out of Many, One.

AGE: 'TIS BUT A NUMBER

When **Carol Menken** spoke to the U.S. squad ahead of the Oregon State game, she asked for a show of hands — she wanted to know who was over the age of 26. Eight of the 11 USA athletes in the circle that morning raised their hands. Why did Menken ask about that specific age? Because in 1984, when she won gold at the Olympics, Menken was the oldest member of the U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team.

40 IS THE NEW 20

Sue Bird will turn 41 this year and **Diana Taurasi** has less than one more trip around the sun before hitting 40. However, they are by no means an anomaly.

Tom Brady won the NFL Super Bowl at age 43, and is the oldest player to be named Super Bowl MVP and win a Super Bowl as the starting quarterback.

Gordie Howe was on two NHL All-Star Teams after turning 40 and played in the league until he was 52.

Martina Navratilova, between 44-50 years of age won 12 doubles titles and an additional three mixed doubles Grand Slam titles.

Darra Torres was 41 when she won three silver medals in swimming at the 2008 Olympics.

Alejandro Valverde, currently 41, is the oldest rider in the 2021 Tour de France and on July 11 finished second in a high mountain stage, trailing the 26-year-old American Sepp Kuss by a mere 23 seconds after more than five hours in the saddle.

WHAT'S AT STAKE?

Not only is a gold medal up for grabs at the Olympics, the winner will earn a berth in the 2022 FIBA World Cup, which is scheduled to be held in Sydney from Sept. 22-Oct. 1.

USA BASKETBALL HONORS

USA Basketball Female Athlete of the Year honors have been earned by four members of the USA squad and USA head coach **Dawn Staley** (1994, 2004) a total of 11 years. **Diana Taurasi** (2006, 2010, 2012, 2016) is tied with five-time Olympian **Teresa Edwards** for the most, earning the honor four times in her illustrious career.

Breanna Stewart (2011, 2013, 2018) has earned the honor three times and **Tina Charles** (2009) and **A'ja Wilson** (2015) round out the list.

TODDLER ON BOARD

The U.S. Olympic Team has two moms on the roster this year as both **Skylar Diggins-Smith** and **Diana Taurasi** have a young son with them in Las Vegas. Taurasi's son Leo was born in 2018 and Diggins-Smith gave birth in 2019. It's not the first time a child has been around the team - **Kara Braxton**, **Lisa Leslie**, **Candace Parker**, **Sheryl Swoopes** and **Tina Thompson** had their young children with them during USA National Team training camps.

Further, **Yolanda Griffith** and **Taj McWilliams-Franklin** also were moms while playing with the red, white and blue. Due to school commitments, however, their children did not travel with the USA team.

FACTS: 2020(1) OLYMPIC GAMES WOMEN'S BASKETBALL COMPETITION

Winners of the past six Olympic gold medals, the USA owns a record **eight gold** medals, **one silver** medal and **one bronze** medal, while compiling an all-time **68-3** record in Olympic play since women's basketball was first introduced to the Olympic program in 1976.

In 2016, the U.S. took the gold medal, while Spain captured silver and Serbia won bronze.

The 2020 Olympic competition will see a different tournament format than in the past. The 12 teams will be split into three groups of four teams apiece for preliminary play.

Following the July 27-Aug. 3 preliminary round, teams will be seeded, and the top two teams from each group and the two best third place teams, according to FIBA's placement rules, will qualify for the medal round. In the medal round, teams will compete in a knockout bracket, with winners advancing from the Aug. 5 quarterfinals to the Aug. 7 semifinals. The gold-medal game will be played on Aug. 9, ahead of the 2020 closing ceremony.

HOPEY'S HEART

Tina Charles, like many athletes, has used her position as a professional basketball player to give back to various causes that are close to her heart.

In 2011, Charles read about the untimely passing of Fennville High School (Mich.) basketball player **Wes Leonard**, who died of sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) at the end of one of his basketball games. Leonard could have been saved with an automated external defibrillator (AED).

Moved by his tragedy, Charles donated \$14,775 to the New York Department of Education and the Wes Leonard Heart Team to purchase AEDs.

In 2012 Charles partnered with OmniPeace and buildOn to build a new school in Mali. She paid for the entire project, which cost about \$32,000.

She contributed additional efforts to charity but changed her focus early in 2013 when her aunt, **Maureen "Hopey" Vaz** passed away due to multiple organ failure. The Leonard tragedy, coupled with her aunt's death, motivated Charles to set up a foundation in her aunt's memory.

In 2014 and 2015 Charles donated half her WNBA salary to Hopey's Heart Foundation, which provides AEDs to schools and organizations across the U.S. Her hope is that it will extend to all gymnasiums in which EuroLeague and EuroCup teams practice and play.

RECORD SETTER

Sue Bird has the USA record for most World Cup teams, and has won **four gold** (2002, 2010, 2014, 2018) and **one bronze** (2006) medal in her five World Cup appearances. She is the only person in history of the game, men or women, regardless of country, with five FIBA World Cup medals. Further, she sits atop the medal board among all World Cup participants in history. Bird is the lone female among five-time medalists, and the three men who have earned four World Cup medals earned only two golds apiece.

CRANK IT UP TO 11

There are only 11 players in USA history who have won the four major championships in U.S. women's basketball: an Olympic gold medal, FIBA World Cup gold medal, WNBA title and NCAA title. Those 11 are: **Sue Bird, Swin Cash, Tamika Catchings, Cynthia Cooper, Asjha Jones, Brittney Griner, Maya Moore, Breanna Stewart, Sheryl Swoopes, Diana Taurasi and Kara Wolters.**

Taking into account **Anne Donovan's** college titles at Old Dominion, Olympic and World Cup golds as a player, and her WNBA title as a coach, she also deserves mention here.

WHO PICKED THIS TEAM?

USA Basketball Women's National Team director **Carol Callan** chairs the USA Basketball Women's National Team Player Selection Committee, which includes three-time Olympic and two-time World Cup gold medalist **Katie Smith** as the athlete representative; WNBA representatives **Bethany Donaphin**, head of league operations, and Connecticut Sun head coach **Curt Miller**; and University of Connecticut head coach **Geno Auremma**, who coached USA teams to gold medals at the past two Olympics and FIBA World Cups, serves as a special advisor.

RECORD WATCH TAKE 2

The USA owns an Olympic record **winning streak of 51-straight** games, dating to the 1992 bronze medal game. A win against France would make 52-straight victories. The second-longest winning streak in Olympic women's basketball history also belongs to the United States with 15, recorded from its final game in 1976 through its first three games in 1992. The third-longest was the 13-consecutive wins by the former Soviet Union from 1976 through its first two games in 1984.

GOLD MEDAL PIPELINE

The USA Basketball women's program currently is No. 1 in all FIBA rankings. USA Basketball women are the defending champion at the Olympics, FIBA World Cup, FIBA AmeriCup, FIBA U19 and U17 World Cups, and the FIBA Americas U16 and U18 Championships.

TWO-DECADE CLUB

Sue Bird and **Diana Taurasi** each first donned a USA Basketball uniform in 2000, Bird as a member of the USA R. William Jones Cup Team and Taurasi as a member of the USA Junior World Championship Qualifying Team (U18). Bird joined the USA National Team with 48 hours of winning the 2002 NCAA title and won FIBA World Cup gold that year and Taurasi also went straight from a NCAA crown to the WNT and won 2004 Olympic gold months later.

STRIVE FOR FIVE

Sue Bird and **Diana Taurasi** are on a quest to become the first basketball athletes in history with five Olympic gold medals each. Should they accomplish this in Tokyo, the duo will join a very small list of storied Olympic athletes who have earned five or more Olympic gold medals in the same event or discipline (ie: 100 meter butterfly or soccer or synchronized swimming). Sue Bird is the most decorated FIBA athlete on the planet, with a combined nine Olympic and World Cup medals. **Teresa Edwards** and **Diana Taurasi** are close behind with eight Olympic and World Cup medals each.

Bird, who owns the most gold medals in history at the two events combined, has eight gold medals and one bronze. Taurasi owns seven gold medals and one bronze medal and Edwards has six gold medals and two bronze medals at the two international majors.

Currently listing in the fourth spot with seven medals are **Tamika Catchings** (four Olympic, three World Cup medals) and **Lisa Leslie** (four Olympic, three World Cup medals); while **Katrina McClain**, **Katie Smith**, **Dawn Staley** and **Sheryl Swoopes** have earned a total of six medals each at international basketball's top two events.

GOLDEN STREAK: TRADITIONAL TEAM SPORTS

The USA Basketball Women's National Team since 1996 has captured six-straight Olympic gold medals, a feat only two other countries' traditional team sports have accomplished, and no other women's traditional team sport has done. (NOTE: For the purpose of this list, a traditional team sport is typically played with balls and pucks with athletes competing together on the field of play. Synchronized swimming was included due to the size of the team on the field of play at the same time and beach volleyball because it was born out of a traditional team sport).

Tops on the list is the United States as the U.S. Olympic men's basketball teams earned seven consecutive gold medals from 1936-1968, before being awarded the silver medal in the controversial 1972 gold medal game.

Sitting at No. 2 with the USA women's hoopsters on the list is India, which claimed six-straight men's field hockey gold medals from 1928-1956.

100-POINT GAMES

In its first game of the 2016 Olympics – a 121-56 rout over Senegal on Aug. 7 – the 2016 U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team scored more points, won by more points (65) and dished out more assists (36) than any other team in U.S. women's Olympic history. In all, the 2016 team hit the century mark in six of its eight games to bring the overall amount of triple-digit scoring games by the U.S. in the Olympics to 20.

2020 OLYMPIC QUALIFYING PROCESS

The USA, by virtue of winning the gold medal at the 2018 FIBA World Cup, along with host Japan, secured berths into the 2020 tournament. However, both nations took part in the 2020 Olympic qualifying process.

In addition to the U.S. and Japan, the top six finishing teams from the 2019 European Championship, along with the eight other nations that advanced out of their respective FIBA Pre-Olympic Qualifying Tournaments in November, vied for the final 10 Olympic slots earned out of the four FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournaments Feb. 6-9, 2020.

The USA competed in the Belgrade, Serbia, group against Mozambique, Nigeria and Serbia. Drawn to play in Bourges, France, were Australia, Brazil, France and Puerto Rico; the competition originally scheduled to be held in Foshan, China, and was moved to Belgrade, included China, Great Britain, South Korea and Spain; while Belgium, Canada, Japan and Sweden played in Ostend, Belgium.

Each team played one game against the other three teams in its pool and the top three finishing teams from each group advanced to play in Tokyo, with the exception of OQT groups that include the USA or Japan. In those groups, only the top two finishing teams that were not the U.S. or Japan, qualified for Tokyo.

2020 U.S. OLYMPIC TEAM RECAPS

USA 86, JAPAN 69

The USA (2-0) defeated Japan (1-1) 86-69 on July 30.

A'ja Wilson a double-double with 20 points and 10 rebounds, while Breanna Stewart had 15 points, 13 rebounds and six assists. Brittney Griner also had 15 points, while Jewell Loyd had 12 and Diana Taurasi finished with 11 points.

Japan was led by Ezinne Kalu's 16 points and six rebounds. Japan.

Another upset seemed possible in the first quarter as Japan went 6-for-10 on 3-point attempts and had the USA on its heels defensively. The Americans clamped down the rest of the game, with Japan hitting only 4-of-28 from deep the rest of the way. After scoring 30 points in the first quarter, Japan had 39 for the rest of the game.

The U.S. had a distinct size advantage, with an average height of 6-foot-1.5 inches to Japan's 5-foot-9 inches. The disparity was even more stark in the starting lineups, with the American starters averaging 5 inches taller.

Both teams came out shooting very well and set a high-scoring pace in the first quarter. The USA scored the first seven points of the game and led 17-9, but Japan stayed in the game with its early 3-point shooting and, surprisingly, by outscoring the Americans in the paint 12-6. Saori Miyazaki's 3-pointer gave Japan a 30-28 lead after the first 10 minutes.

In the second quarter, the pace slowed considerably while the shooting remained efficient. It was 36-36 with 5:15 left in the half when the USA rattled off the next seven points for a 43-36 edge. That allowed the U.S. to hang on for a 49-40 halftime lead.

Japan held the USA without a basket for 4:22 of the third quarter and went on a 9-1 run to pull within 55-51, snapped by Wilson's three-point play with 4:13 left. Wilson had 10 points in the third as the U.S. took a 65-53 lead into the final quarter.

Sue Bird's first basket of the Tokyo Olympics came on a 3-pointer with 2:55 left to give the U.S. an 84-64 lead that essentially sealed the result.

USA 82, NIGERIA 71

Behind A'ja Wilson's and Brittney Griner's double-doubles and the formidable presence of Diana Taurasi and Sue Bird, the U.S. topped Nigeria (0-1) 81-72 on July 27. It was the 50th consecutive Olympic victory for the U.S., a streak that began when the Americans won bronze at the 1992 Barcelona Olympics.

Wilson, in her Olympic debut, had 19 points and 13 rebounds, while Griner finished with 13 point and 10 boards. Taurasi had 10 first-half points. Though Bird didn't score, she did have 13 assists and four rebounds.

Taurasi was back in action for the first time since July 3. A hip muscle strain that kept her out of all three exhibition games in Las Vegas came after she missed more than a month with the WNBA's Phoenix Mercury due to a fractured sternum.

The U.S. came out sluggish, missing its first four shots and turning the ball over four times. The Americans were down 8-1 before Taurasi hit the first USA basket with 6:14 left in the first quarter. That

started an 11-0 run for a 12-8 lead.

Nigeria regained the lead at the end of the first quarter on a 3-pointer.

Neither team shot well in the first quarter, with Nigeria at 23.8% (5-of-24) and the USA at 33.3% (5-of-15). Nigeria went 8-of-10 from the free-throw line, however, while the U.S. committed eight first-quarter turnovers.

Nigeria then went up 25-20 with 8:07 left in the half. That's when the USA took off on its 23-0 burst and eventual 44-32 advantage at halftime. The Americans got out into transition in the second quarter, which helped them convert 68.8% (11-of-16) of their shots.

The Americans opened the second half on a 14-4 run to create a cushion. Nigeria stayed aggressive and went on a 12-0 run to pull within 75-67 with 3:20 left, but the U.S. rattled off the next six points to end the comeback threat.

2021 USA NATIONAL TEAM EXHIBITION RECAPS

USA 93, NIGERIA 62

The USA used an early 14-0 run to take control against Nigeria en route to a 93-62 victory on July 18 at Michelob ULTRA Arena at Mandalay Bay, which gave the Americans a 1-2 record during its six-day stay in Las Vegas.

A'ja Wilson had 16 points and 10 rebounds for the Americans, while **Breanna Stewart** had 14 points, **Brittney Griner** scored 12 and **Sylvia Fowles** and **Jewell Loyd** finished with 10 each. Diana Taurasi sat out all three exhibition games due to a strained hip muscle.

Antonye Nyingifa led Nigeria with nine points.

The USA National Team has now won 200 exhibition games against just 18 losses (a .917 winning percentage) since the historic 1995-96 USA National Team's 52-game lead-up to the 1996 Olympic Games.

Griner and Wilson were a big key to the quick start for the U.S. After Wilson scored the first four American points, Griner added the next four to put the USA up 8-4. Griner's second hoop triggered the 14-0 run that put the U.S. up 20-4 with 3:37 left in the first quarter.

A stifling defense was a big part of grabbing the early advantage as well, as the USA held Nigeria to 35.3% (6-17 FGs) in the first quarter and 30.6% (22-72 FGs) for the game.

Meanwhile, the Americans converted 53.8% (35-65 FGs) of their shots. They also made 9-of-16 3-pointers after hitting just 2-of-18 against Australia.

AUSTRALIA 70, USA 67

The USA suffered a 70-67 setback to Australia on July 16 at the Michelob ULTRA Arena at Mandalay Bay in Las Vegas.

The U.S. was hoping to get back on track with another day of practice. But the USA had 18 turnovers and shot 37.3% (25-67 FGs) overall and was just 2-of-18 from 3-point.

Breanna Stewart led the U.S. with 17 points and 12 rebounds, including 10 points and four rebounds in the second quarter. **A'ja Wilson** was the only other American in double figures with 12 points, as all 11 players who saw action played at least 9 minutes, 51 seconds.

Ezi Magbegor, who plays on the WNBA's Seattle Storm, led Australia with 17 points. Australia played without star Liz Cambage, who took herself off the Olympic roster following an incident in a scrimmage against Nigeria.

Thanks to Stewart's strong second quarter, the U.S. was up 41-28 at halftime. But Australia turned up the pressure on the Americans, who turned the ball over 15 times in the second half.

The Aussies made 10-of-26 3-pointers.

Following an Australia turnover with 10.9 seconds left, Stewart had a chance to send the game to overtime, but her

3-pointer from the right wing was off the mark.

Among the things the U.S. did well was dominate the boards. The Americans held a 41-28 rebounding advantage.

WNBA ALL-STAR 93, USA 85

The USA dropped the first of three pre-Tokyo games when it fell 93-85 to the WNBA All-Stars on July 14 at Michelob ULTRA Arena at Mandalay Bay in Las Vegas.

Three U.S. players scored in double digits, led by **Brittney Griner** with 17 points. **Breanna Stewart** added 15 points, six rebounds and three assists, while **Sylvia Fowles** scored 12 and had a team-leading seven rebounds.

The WNBA's **Arike Ogunbowale** scored nine of her 26 points in the fourth quarter and was named All-Star MVP.

Unlike the three previous meetings between the USA and WNBA stars — when the U.S. won by an average of 23 points — this game was tight until the end.

Giving up 93 points is never ideal. The WNBA shot 46.4% (39-84 FGs), while the U.S. made 47.3% (35-74 FGs) of its shots. But the USA lost the rebounding battle 41-37. Jonquel Jones had 14 boards for the WNBA, double that of U.S. leader Fowles.

Pat Summitt becomes the first American woman to be a player (1976), assistant coach (1980) and head coach (1984) on three Olympic teams.

1986 World Championship: Held in Moscow, the United States soundly thrashed host USSR 108-88 in the gold medal game, dethroning the defending champs. Anne Donovan cited this game as a turning point for the USA in international play. It also proved the USA's Goodwill Games gold medal - also coming against the Soviets in Moscow that summer - was no fluke.

1988 Olympics: Gold.

1990 World Championship: Gold.

1991 Pan American Games: Bronze. This is notable because in the previous nine Pan Am Games, the USA never had finished lower than second, claiming six golds along the way.

1992 Olympics: Bronze.

1994 World Championship: Bronze.

Dec. 4, 1994: USA Basketball announces the 1995-96 USA National Team program. After finishing in third place at the 1991 Pan Am, 1992 Olympics and 1994 Worlds, it was

decided the USA teams needed longer training camps in order to compete for gold at the 1996 Olympics and beyond.

April 13, 1995: Tara VanDerveer is named the 1995-96 Women's National Team head coach.

May 25, 1995: Following seven days of trials that began with 24 of the nation's elite athletes, 11 were named to the historic 1995-96 USA Basketball Women's Senior National Team, including Jennifer Azzi, Ruthie Bolton, Teresa Edwards, Lisa Leslie, Rebecca Lobo, Katrina McClain, Nikki McCray, Carla McGhee, Dawn Staley, Katy Steding and Sheryl Swoopes.

April - May, 1996: Twelve different USA team hopefuls train with the USA National Team at various camps and competitions.

May 9, 1996: Eighteen finalists for the U.S. Olympic Team are announced.

June 16, 1996: The final 12-member U.S. Women's Olympic Basketball Team is named, and in addition to the original 11 USA National Team members, includes Venus Lacey.

July 13, 1996: The USA ends its pre-Olympic training with a 52-0 record.

July 20, 1996: Teresa Edwards is elected by her fellow U.S. athletes to give the athlete oath on behalf of all Olympians, while Katrina McClain helped carry the Olympic flag into the stadium during the opening ceremony in Atlanta.

1996 Olympics: The USA put Brazil away early, finishing with a 111-87 victory, and captured the gold medal with an unblemished 8-0 record.

April 1, 1997: Nell Fortner is named head coach of the national team program through 2000.

May 23, 1998: The USA World Championship Team ends its exhibition play with a 12-1 record against top international opponents. The lone loss was against

Australia on April 27 in Japan.

1998 World Championship: Gold.

Sept. 1999: The USA kicks-off a nearly year-long preparation process, with a break for the WNBA season, with 10 team members, including Ruthie Bolton, Teresa Edwards, Yolanda Griffith, Chamique Holdsclaw, Lisa Leslie, Nikki McCray, DeLisha Milton, Katie Smith, Dawn Staley and Natalie Williams.

Jan. 6, 2000: Kara Wolters, who trained with the team since September, is officially added to the 1999-2000 USA National

Team.

June 25, 2000: Sheryl Swoopes is added to the USA squad.

Sept 9, 2000: The USA team caps its exhibition schedule with a 38-2 record against top international club and national teams, as well as a 12-game NCAA tour. The two losses came against Tennessee and Brazil.

Aug. 29, 2000: Nell Fortner earns her 100th victory as a USA Basketball head coach after the U.S. takes a 78-55 semifinal win over South Korea.

2000 Olympics: Gold. Teresa Edwards retires as the most decorated Olympic basketball player on the planet, male or female, owning four gold medals and one bronze medal. She also earned two World Championship golds and one World Championship bronze medal.

Nov. 8, 2001: Van Chancellor is named the 2002 USA World Championship Team head coach.

Sept. 10, 2002: The U.S. wrapped up the Australia-hosted Opals World Challenge with a 4-0 record and owned a 5-0 slate overall in pre-Worlds play.

2002 World Championship: Gold.

June 10, 2003: Van Chancellor is named head coach of the 2004 U.S. Olympic Team.

Oct. 8, 2003: The first seven members of the 2003-04 USA National Team are announced and include Tamika Catchings, Shannon Johnson, Lisa Leslie, DeLisha Milton-Jones, Katie Smith and Tina Thompson. Aug. 13, 2004: Voted by her peers as the USA delegation's flag bearer, Dawn Staley leads the United States into the 2004 Olympic opening ceremony in Athens.

March 10, 2017: University of South Carolina head coach Dawn Staley, who was a USA National Team assistant coach from 2006-08 and 2014-16, is announced as the 2017-20 USA National Team head

2018 World Cup: Gold. Sue Bird becomes the most decorated international basketball player in the world after earning a fourth FIBA World Cup gold to go with her four Olympic gold medals and one World Cup bronze medal.

July 27, 2019: USA Basketball unveiled an expanded training program that will include five segments and help the USA prepare in its quest for a seventh straight gold medal. June 21, 2021: The 2020 U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team was unveiled on NBC's TODAY Show and included two now five-time Olympians, one four-time Olympian, one three-time Olympian, two who will be competing in their second Olympics and six who will step on the Olympic court for the first time this summer.

July 23, 2021: For the first time in modern Olympic history, nations had two flag bearers lead their delegation into Opening Ceremony. USA Basketball's **Sue Bird**, a five-time Olympian and four-time gold medalist (2004-2016), shared the duty with baseball's Eddy Alvarez. Bird lists as just the second basketball player to carry the U.S. flag into an Olympic Opening Ceremony. USA head coach **Dawn Staley** had the honor in 2004.
