# 2018 USA World Cup Team Notes

## Final Four

Of the four teams remaining in the hunt for gold, **the USA owns the most World Cup hardware** with **nine gold** medals, **one silver** medal and **two bronze** medals. After earning the first two World Cup golds in 1953 and 1957, the U.S. returned to the top of the podium in 1979, took home silver in 1983, and then earned gold in 1986 and 1990, bronze in 1994, gold in 1998 and 2002, bronze in 2006 and gold in 2010 and 2014. Should the U.S. claim gold in Tenerife, it would mark the first time the red, white and blue has earned three-straight gold medals in World Cup play.

**Australia claimed gold in Brazil in 2006** and took home **bronze** medals in **1998, 2002 and 2014**.

**Spain** has finished on the podium twice in World Cup history, and after bringing home **bronze in 2010** and **silver in 2014**, is looking for its first gold in 2018.

Newcomers to the World Cup, Belgium wasn't satisfied with simply qualifying for the competition. The upstarts are looking for their first medal at a major world competition.

Against the final four teams, the USA owns an all-time 57-7 win-loss record in international play, which includes the Olympics; World Cups; U21, U19 and U17 World Cups; and World University Games. The U.S. is 31-3 against Australia, 2-0 against Belgium and 24-3 over Spain.

The last time the USA faced Australia in official international play was in the 2017 U17 World Cup semifinals, which Australia won 73-60. Belgium and the USA last played in the 2012 U17s, with the USA taking an 80-50 victory, and the most recent USA-Spain match-up was in the 2018 U17 quarterfinals, which the U.S. won, 66-31.

## What's at Stake?

Winners of the past two FIBA World Cups, the USA Basketball Women's National Team is hoping to make it three in a row later this month. Not only has the USA never claimed three-straight World Cup gold medals, but the winner of the 2018 World Cup earns an automatic berth into the 2020 Olympic Games.

Should the USA claim gold in Tenerife, **Jewell Loyd**, who earned a gold medal at the 2014 FIBA 3x3 World Cup, would become the first player in history to garner gold at both of FIBA's senior-level World Cups.

## Nearing the 10K Mark

The USA Basketball Women's World Cup Teams through the years compiled 9,639 points heading into the 2018 competition. With its 660 points in its first three games, bringing the USA's all-time point total to **9,999**, the 2018 USA squad needs to score **one** point to bring the USA's all-time point total to a record **10,000** points.

## Remembering Anne Donovan

USA Basketball celebrates the life of Anne Donovan, who played on her first USA Basketball team in 1977, and passed away June 13, 2018. During her Hall of Fame, 31-year USA career, she was a member of five U.S. Olympic teams and four USA World Championship teams as an athlete and coach, culminating in leading the 2008 U.S. Olympic Team to gold as our head coach in Beijing.

She used to say she bled red, white and blue.

As much as we remember her accomplishments in the game, we mourn a dear friend who will be greatly missed.

As a player and coach, Donovan spanned several generations of the USA Basketball Women's National Team program, competing alongside, playing for and coaching numerous Hall of Fame inductees.

Donovan was 17 when she played on her first USA Basketball team at the 1977 R. William Jones Cup. While her team went 3-4 and finished in fifth place, it was the only competition in which she played or coached without returning home with a medal.

A two-time gold medalist at the 1978 and 1979 U.S. Olympic Festivals, Donovan earned a spot on the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team. The team, which did not compete at the 1980 Moscow Olympics, traveled to the 1980 FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament where the USA claimed gold, putting the world on notice that the Americans would have been strong contenders for gold in Moscow.

Donovan went on to play in two Olympic games, claiming gold medals in 1984 and 1988 and two FIBA World Championships, striking gold in 1986 and silver in 1983.

In all, she won 10 gold medals and two silver medals while compiling a 69-8 overall record as an athlete.

Perhaps her most memorable summer was 1986, which she noted many years later as the summer in which the tide turned



for the USA women's program.

The 1986 USA Goodwill Games team claimed the gold medal in July in Moscow, defeating the Soviets 83-60 in the gold medal game in a warm-up for the upcoming FIBA World Championship, held in August and also in Moscow. The two powers entered the gold medal game with matching, 6-0 records. The USA wanted to prove that the Goodwill Games gold medal was no fluke and did so by running past the USSR 108-88 for gold.

"We had gone there earlier in the summer for the Goodwill Games and won gold medal," recalled Donovan in a 2006 USA Basketball feature. "But, everybody attributed that to 'well they weren't really playing, wait until the World Championship.' So to go back to Russia and beat them twice in the same summer, that's when the guard changed. The U.S. women were now the best of the best and from that point on we've been running."

As an assistant coach, Donovan helped lead USA teams to gold at the 2004 Olympic games, and the 1998 and 2002 World Championships, as well as a silver medal at the 1997 FIBA

Americas World Championship Qualifying Tournament. Including exhibition games, Donovan assisted USA teams to a 58-2 mark.

Named the head coach for the 2006-08 USA Basketball Women's National Team, Donovan piloted the team to a 57-6 record, culminating in the 2008 Olympic gold medal run, which saw the U.S. earn an 8-0 record and the USA's fourth-straight Olympic gold. During her stint as head coach, she also headed up the 2006 USA World Championship Team that returned home with the bronze medal and led the USA to gold at the 2007 FIBA American Championship.

In all, Donovan claimed 16 gold medals, five silver medals and one bronze medal in various competitions during her illustrious career, but her impact on the game is more than a collection of medals.

Her grace, friendship and passion for life will live on in our memories.

## A Rare Trio

FIBA has never before listed three former U19 World Cup MVPs on a World Cup roster -- until this year. The USA trio of **Nneka Ogwumike** (2009), **Breanna Stewart** (2013) and **A'ja Wilson** (2015) make up the tri-fecta.

## Who Picks the Team?

USA Basketball Women's National Team director **Carol Callan** chairs the USA Basketball Women's National Team Player Selection Committee, which includes three-time Olympic and two-time World Cup gold medalist **Katie Smith** as the athlete representative; representing the WNBA is Connecticut Sun head coach **Curt Miller** and Los Angeles Sparks general manager **Penny Toler**; and University of Connecticut head coach **Geno Auremma**, who coached USA teams to gold medals at the past two Olympics and FIBA World Cups, serves as a special advisor.

## USA Basketball Honors

Ten of the past USA Basketball Female Athlete of the Year honors have been earned by five members of the 2018 USA World Cup Team finalists, including head coach **Dawn Staley**, who garnered the award in 1994 and 2004. **Diana Taurasi** (2006, 2010, 2012, 2016) is tied with five-time Olympian **Teresa Edwards** for the most, earning the honor four times in her illustrious career. **Breanna Stewart** also is a multiple award winner, earning USA Athlete of the Year in 2011 and 2013, while **Tina Charles** (2009) and **A'ja Wilson** (2015) round out the list.

## USA Basketball Experience

Every member of the 2018 USA World Cup Team has one at least one international tournament title playing for USA Basketball in international competitions. The top-rated gold medals of course were earned at either the Olympic Games or FIBA World Cups by **Sue Bird**, **Tina Charles**, **Elena Delle Donne**, **Brittney Griner**, **Nneka Ogwumike**, **Breanna Stewart** and **Diana Taurasi**. However, before taking part in those competitions, most athletes play for USA Basketball in junior-level events such as the FIBA Americas U16 Championship or FIBA U19 World Cup.

## Crank it up to 11

Prior to this year's WNBA Finals, there were only 10 players in USA history who had won the four major championships in U.S. women's basketball: an Olympic gold medal, FIBA World Cup gold medal, WNBA title and NCAA title. Those 10 are: **Sue Bird**, **Swin Cash**, **Tamika Catchings**, **Cynthia Cooper**, **Asjha Jones**, **Brittney Griner**, **Maya Moore**, **Sheryl Swoopes**, **Diana Taurasi** and **Kara Wolters**.

With the Seattle Storm's 2018 WNBA championship, **Breanna Stewart** brings that exclusive club to 11.

Taking into account **Anne Donovan's** college titles at Old Dominion, Olympic and World Championship golds as a player, and her WNBA title as a coach, she also deserves mention here.

## Record Setter

**Sue Bird** already has the USA record for most World Cup teams, and has won three gold (2002, 2010, 2014) and one bronze (2006) medal in her four World Cup appearances. Should she claim another medal in 2018, she would become the only person in history with five FIBA World Cup medals. In fact, Bird already owns more hardware than any of the eight women and one man who have participated in five World Cups. Further, she sits atop the medal board among all World Cup participants in history. Bird is the lone female among four-time medalists, and the

three men who have earned four World Cup medals have only two golds apiece.

## The Numbers Game

- The USA's World Cup winning streak is **20-0**, dating from the 2006 bronze medal game through the USA's victory over Nigeria in Tenerife.
- The USA's Olympic winning streak is **49-0**, dating from the 1992 bronze medal game through the 2016 gold medal game.
- In the past **22 years**, the highly successful USA Basketball Women's National Team program, currently ranked No. 1 in the world by FIBA, has posted a **98-1** slate in major international competitions, winning an amazing six consecutive Olympic gold medals (1996, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016), four FIBA World Championship golds (1998, 2002, 2010, 2014), one FIBA World Championship bronze medal (2006) and one FIBA Americas Championship gold medal (2007), and including its 3-0 slate in Tenerife.

## Not Always as Easy as it Seems

Many people might look at the USA's overall record and medal count at the FIBA World Cup and assume the USA is never really tested. That couldn't be further from the truth. Take a look at some of the tough contests the U.S. squad played over the past five World Cups.

### 1998 FIBA World Championship (9-0)

*Margin of victory: +19.0 ppg. (84.1 ppg. to 65.1 ppg.)*

- **USA 95, JPN 89:** After taking a 44-33 lead at half, the USA faltered, and Japan tied the game 52-52 with 15:51 to play. But the U.S. fought back and earned the six-point win.
- **USA 79, ESP 68:** The USA was up only 37-33 at halftime and was never able to put Spain away, but earned the 11-point win.
- **USA 71, RUS 65:** The USA found itself in the unfamiliar territory of trailing at halftime, 37-28. Fighting back in the second half, the game's deciding moment came with 1:46 remaining. With the U.S. trailing 61-60, Ruthie Bolton nailed a 3 to put the USA into the lead 63-61. Russia tied the game, but Bolton answered with another 3-pointer to give the U.S. a 66-63 lead at 1:12. Russia scored to make it a one-point game with 52 seconds left, then Lisa Leslie increased the U.S. lead back to three, 68-65, with 34 seconds showing. Russia turned the ball over on its following possession, and Katie Smith recovered it. Dawn Staley made 3-of-4 from the line in the final 10 seconds.

### 2002 FIBA World Championship (9-0)

*Margin of victory: +33.9 ppg. (88.6 ppg. to 54.7 ppg.)*

- **USA 71, AUS 56:** The U.S. was up by 10 at the half, 39-29, but Australia cut it to eight on three occasions in the second half, the last with the U.S. up 64-56 at 3:10. The USA outscored Australia 7-0

to close the game.

- **USA 79, RUS 74:** Up 48-35 at halftime, the USA's lead was cut to 72-71 with 3:28 to play. The U.S. held Russia scoreless while Lisa Leslie hit 2-of-4 from the line, followed by a jumper, that put the U.S. up 76-71 with 56 seconds to play. From there, each team made 3-of-4 from the line.

### 2006 FIBA World Championship (8-1)

*Avg. Scoring Margin: +27.8 ppg. (86.6 ppg. to 58.8 ppg.)*

- **RUS 75, USA 68:** After defeating Russia 90-80 in the preliminary round, the U.S. fell behind early, 25-13 after the first quarter, and never fully recovered in its semifinal game against Russia and dropped its first major international game in 12 years. The U.S. twice cut the deficit to three points twice in the second quarter, but the Russians went to the locker room ahead 37-32. Russia completely controlled the third period and outscored the U.S. 21-6 and went up 58-38 with 10 minutes to play. While the Americans outscored Russia 30-17 in the fourth quarter, the hole was too large to escape, and the USA had to settle for playing the bronze medal.

### 2010 FIBA World Championship (9-0)

*Margin of victory: (96.2 ppg. to 61.1 ppg.)*

- **USA 83, AUS 75:** The U.S. took an early lead and went up 51-33 at halftime. Australia stormed back in the second half, outscoring the USA 42-32, including holding the USA to a 2014 single-quarter low of 11 points in the fourth quarter, but the USA came away with the eight-point win.

### 2014 FIBA World Championship (6-0)

*Margin of victory: +28.8 ppg. (92.2 ppg. to 63.3 ppg.)*

- **USA 94, SRB 74:** Serbia led 57-56 midway through the third quarter and trailed by just six, 70-64, heading into the fourth quarter. However, the USA's outscored Serbia 24-10 in the final stanza.
- **USA 82, AUS 70:** Australia was within six points, 61-55, early in the fourth quarter. Australia went on a 13-8 run to close the game, but the USA outscored Australia 21-18 overall in the fourth for the win.

## Medal Haul

**Sue Bird** and **Teresa Edwards** are the most decorated FIBA athletes on the planet with both earning a combined eight Olympic and World Cup medals. Bird, who owns the most gold medals in history at the two events combined, has seven gold medals and one bronze, while Edwards has six gold medals and two bronze at the two international majors.

Currently listing in the second spot with seven are **Tamika Catchings** (four Olympic, three World Cup medals), **Lisa Leslie** (four Olympic, three World Cup medals) and **Diana Taurasi** (four Olympic, three World Cup medals); while **Katrina McClain**, **Katie Smith**, **Dawn Staley** and **Sheryl Swoopes** have earned a total of six medals each at international basketball's top two events.

Should they medal in 2018, Bird would sit alone in the top spot, while Taurasi would join Edwards in second.

# USA National Team Timeline

- **1953 World Championship:** Gold.
- **1957 World Championship:** Gold.
- **1964 World Championship:** Fourth place.
- **1967 World Championship:** 11th place.
- **1971 World Championship:** Eighth place.
- **1975 World Championship:** Eighth place.
- **1976 Olympics:** The USA returns from the first Olympic women's basketball tournament with the silver medal.
- **1979 World Championship:** USA ends its medal drought at the Worlds with its first gold since 1957, halting the USSR's dominating hold on gold.
- **1980 Olympics:** The U.S. boycott kept the women from competing in Moscow; however, the USA squad won the Olympic qualifying tournament in Bulgaria that summer. While the USSR did not compete in that tournament, the USA's gold let the world know the Americans would have been in medal contention in Moscow.



**The 1953 USA Women's World Championship Team returned from Chile and the first FIBA World Championship with a 5-1 record and the gold medal.**

- **1983 World Championship:** Silver.
- **1984 Olympics:** The U.S. won its first Olympic gold medal in Los Angeles. The Soviet-bloc countries boycotted the Games, however, so there was no long-awaited USA-USSR showdown. Pat Summitt becomes the first American woman to be a player (1976), assistant coach (1980) and head coach (1984) on three Olympic teams.
- **1986 World Championship:** Held in Moscow, the United States soundly thrashed host USSR 108-88 in the gold medal game, dethroning the defending champs. Anne Donovan cited this game as a turning point for the USA in international play. It also proved the USA's Goodwill Games gold medal - also coming against the Soviets in Moscow that summer - was no fluke.
- **1988 Olympics:** Gold.
- **1990 World Championship:** Gold.
- **1991 Pan American Games:** Bronze. This is notable because in the previous nine Pan Am Games, the USA never had finished lower than second, claiming six golds along the way.
- **1992 Olympics:** Bronze.
- **1994 World Championship:** Bronze.
- **Dec. 4, 1994:** USA Basketball announces the 1995-96 USA National Team program. After finishing in third place at the 1991 Pan Ams, 1992 Olympics and 1994 Worlds, it was decided the USA teams needed longer training camps in order to compete for gold at the 1996 Olympics and beyond.
- **April 13, 1995:** Tara VanDerveer is named the 1995-96 Women's National Team head coach.
- **May 25, 1995:** Following seven days of trials that began with 24 of the nation's elite athletes, 11 were named to the historic 1995-96 USA Basketball Women's Senior National Team, including Jennifer Azzi, Ruthie Bolton, Teresa Edwards, Lisa Leslie, Rebecca Lobo, Katrina McClain, Nikki McCray, Carla McGhee, Dawn Staley, Katy Steding and Sheryl Swoopes.
- **April - May, 1996:** Twelve different USA team hopefuls train with the USA National Team at various camps and competitions.
- **May 9, 1996:** Eighteen finalists for the U.S. Olympic Team are announced.
- **June 16, 1996:** The final 12-member U.S. Women's Olympic Basketball Team is named, and in addition to the original 11 USA National Team members, includes Venus Lacey.
- **July 13, 1996:** The USA ends its pre-Olympic training with a 52-0 record.
- **July 20, 1996:** Teresa Edwards is elected by her fellow U.S. athletes to give the athlete oath on behalf of all Olympians, while Katrina McClain helped carry the Olympic flag into the stadium during the opening ceremony in Atlanta.
- **1996 Olympics:** The USA put Brazil away early, finishing with a 111-87 victory, and captured the gold medal with an unblemished 8-0 record.
- **April 1, 1997:** Nell Fortner is named head coach of the national team program through 2000.
- **May 23, 1998:** The USA World Championship Team ends its exhibition play with a 12-1 record against top international opponents. The lone loss was against Australia on April 27 in Japan.
- **1998 World Championship:** Gold.
- **Sept. 1999:** The USA kicks-off a nearly year-long preparation process, with a break for the WNBA season, with 10 team members, including Ruthie Bolton, Teresa Edwards, Yolanda Griffith, Chamique Holdsclaw, Lisa Leslie, Nikki McCray, DeLisha Milton, Katie Smith, Dawn Staley and Natalie Williams.
- **Jan. 6, 2000:** Kara Wolters, who trained with the team since September, is officially added to the 1999-2000 USA National Team.
- **June 25, 2000:** Sheryl Swoopes is added to the USA squad.
- **Sept 9, 2000:** The USA team caps its exhibition schedule with a 38-2 record against top international club and national teams, as well as a 12-game NCAA tour. The two losses came against Tennessee and Brazil.
- **Aug. 29, 2000:** Nell Fortner earns her 100th victory as a USA Basketball head coach after the U.S. takes a 78-55 semifinal win over South Korea.
- **2000 Olympics:** Gold. Teresa Edwards retires as the most decorated Olympic basketball player on the planet, male or female, owning four gold medals and one bronze medal. She also earned two World Championship golds and one World Championship bronze medal.
- **Nov. 8, 2001:** Van Chancellor is named the 2002 USA World Championship Team head coach.
- **Sept. 10, 2002:** The U.S. wrapped up the Australia-hosted Opals World Challenge with a 4-0 record and owned a 5-0 slate overall in pre-Worlds play.
- **2002 World Championship:** Gold.

# USA National Team Timeline

- **June 10, 2003:** Van Chancellor is named head coach of the 2004 U.S. Olympic Team.
- **Oct. 8, 2003:** The first seven members of the 2003-04 USA National Team are announced and include Tamika Catchings, Shannon Johnson, Lisa Leslie, DeLisha Milton-Jones, Katie Smith and Tina Thompson. Between Jan. 26 and June 19, the final five members were announced, and include (in order) Sheryl Swoopes (1/26/04), Sue Bird (2/05/04), Swin Cash and Diana Taurasi (5/12/04) and Yolanda Griffith (6/19/04).
- **April 13, 2004:** The USA team closes its spring training with a 13-0 mark against top international club and national teams.
- **July 22, 2004:** Ruth Riley is added to the U.S. Olympic Team after DeLisha Milton-Jones, who suffered a knee injury on July 9, was unable to compete and withdrew from the team.
- **Aug. 10, 2004:** The U.S. adds three more victories in pre-Olympic play, bringing the 2004 USA National Team's record to 16-0.
- **Aug. 13, 2004:** Voted by her peers as the USA delegation's flag bearer, Dawn Staley leads the United States into the 2004 Olympic opening ceremony in Athens.
- **2004 Olympics:** Gold. Dawn Staley retires from international play with three-straight Olympic gold medals to go with two World Championship golds and one World Championship bronze medal.
- **Jan. 12, 2006:** Anne Donovan, a 30-year USA Basketball veteran, is named head coach of the USA National Team for 2006-08.
- **March-April, 2006:** A total of 26 athletes participate in the USA's spring training as the U.S. posts a 10-1 record over European professional teams and national teams from Australia, China and Taiwan.
- **Sept. 7, 2006:** The USA earns a 56-49 exhibition victory over eventual 2006 FIBA World Championship gold medalist Australia.
- **2006 World Championship:** Bronze. The USA's gold medal hopes were dashed by Russia in the semifinals, marking the USA National Team's only official FIBA competition loss since the semifinals of the 1994 World Championship. Sheryl Swoopes retires from the USA National Team with three Olympic gold medals, one World Championship gold medal and a pair of World Championship bronze medals.
- **March 6, 2007:** The 2007-08 USA Women's National Team pool is unveiled, consisting of 21 athletes, and the list eventually expands to 29 athletes by October.
- **2007 FIBA Americas Championship:** The USA earns gold to qualify for the 2008 Olympic Games.
- **May 31, 2008:** The first nine athletes are named to the 2008 U.S. Olympic Team: Seimone Augustus, Sue Bird, Sylvia Fowles, Lisa Leslie, Candace Parker, Cappie Pondexter, Katie Smith, Diana Taurasi and Tina Thompson.
- **July 10, 2008:** Tamika Catchings, Kara Lawson and DeLisha Milton-Jones are named as the final three team members.
- **2008 Olympics:** Gold. Lisa Leslie retires from her 20-year USA Basketball career as the first person on the planet to earn four-consecutive Olympic basketball gold medals, while Katie Smith retires from Olympic competition with three-straight gold medals. Leslie earned MVP honors at the 2002 World Championship and both Leslie and Smith also captured two World Championship gold medals and one bronze medal.
- **April 15, 2009:** University of Connecticut head coach Geno Auriemma is introduced as the 2009-12 USA Women's National Team head coach.
- **Aug. 17, 2009:** The first eight members of the 2009-12 USA National Team are announced, all of whom were members of the 2008 U.S. Olympic Team, including Seimone Augustus, Sue Bird, Tamika Catchings, Sylvia Fowles, Kara Lawson, Candace Parker, Cappie Pondexter and Diana Taurasi. The USA National team would eventually include a total of 27 athletes by Jan. 4, 2012.
- **Sept. 21, 2010:** The 2010 USA World Championship Team is named and includes: Jayne Appel, Sue Bird, Swin Cash, Tamika Catchings, Tina Charles, Candice Dupree, Sylvia Fowles, Asjha Jones, Angel McCoughtry, Maya Moore, Diana Taurasi and Lindsay Whalen.
- **2010 World Championship:** Gold.
- **March 30, 2012:** The first 11 members of the 2010 U.S. Olympic Team are named and include nine of the 12 members of the 2010 USA World Championship Team: Seimone Augustus, Sue Bird, Swin Cash, Tamika Catchings, Tina Charles, Sylvia Fowles, Angel McCoughtry, Maya Moore, Candace Parker, Diana Taurasi and Lindsay Whalen.
- **April 23, 2012:** The 2012 U.S. roster is finalized with the addition of Asjha Jones.
- **2012 Olympics:** Gold.
- **Sept. 6, 2013:** USA Basketball announced that Geno Auriemma would return to head up the USA National Team through 2016.
- **2014 World Championship:** Gold. Sue Bird becomes the first female four-time FIBA World Championship participant in history, while also becoming the most decorated male or female in FIBA World Championship history with three gold medals and one bronze medal.
- **April 27, 2016:** With nine members in attendance, the 2016 U.S. Olympic Team was announced live on air to a nationally-televised audience in a TODAY segment during the 100-Days Out celebration in New York City. Announced to the 2016 team were: Seimone Augustus, Sue Bird, Tamika Catchings, Tina Charles, Elena Delle Donne, Sylvia Fowles, Brittney Griner, Angel McCoughtry, Maya Moore, Breanna Stewart, Diana Taurasi and Lindsay Whalen.
- **2016 Olympic Games:** Gold. Sue Bird, Tamika Catchings and Diana Taurasi capture their fourth-straight Olympic gold, joining Teresa Edwards and Lisa Leslie as the only basketball players in the world with four Olympic golds. Catchings officially retires from Olympic competition after also earning two World Championship gold medals and one World Championship bronze. Geno Auriemma completes his stint as the only USA Women's National Team head coach in history to lead teams to two Olympic and two World Championship gold medals.
- **March 10, 2017:** University of South Carolina head coach Dawn Staley, who was a USA National Team assistant coach from 2006-08 and 2014-16, is announced as the 2017-20 USA National Team head coach.
